

This Is Why God Chose You to See the Truth

God, in His omnipotence and wisdom, chooses the hearts into which He plants the seed of truth, much like how a gardener carefully selects the fertile ground for his most precious seeds .

Why, you might ask, would God choose to reveal the deeper truths of existence to you? It's a question as old as time itself, echoed by King Solomon when he pondered the mysteries of the human heart in Ecclesiastes. You see, God's truth isn't merely factual correctness; it's a lantern guiding the footsteps of those who seek His kingdom first. James reminds us in his epistle that wisdom, the kind that draws you closer to God's truth, is given freely to those who ask (James 1:5). This choice for you to understand, to see, to seek out truth, isn't based on your status, but your readiness and your willingness to draw near to Him .

The Bible brims with stories of individuals who were chosen to see the truth. Think of Moses, who witnessed the burning bush (Exodus 3) and understood it as a call from God. They were not chosen randomly; they were chosen because God saw in them the potential to carry forth His message, much like He sees in you. Let this be a living testament of Romans 8:28, "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose" .

Number 2: Embracing the Trust Assignment

Your perspective, now flavored with divine truth, brings zest into the ordinary, making everyday encounters extraordinary mission fields. As light, your role is not to hide the truth but to illuminate the darkness around. Each moment you let His truth shine through your life, you fulfill a critical purpose in God's grand design, influencing those who may have never known what true grace and truth look like .

In His Sermon on the Mount, Jesus explains how actions informed by divine truth become the very

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reflection of God's sovereignty and love. Therefore, understanding truth isn't passive. Like Jesus turning over tables in zeal for His Father's house (John 2:13-17), truth stirs action. It compels love in deeds, compassion in encounters, and holiness in conduct. As Pilate infamously asked, "What is truth?" (John 18:38), you are called not only to answer through words but to model truth through life. The integrity and authenticity lived out become magnets to those searching, curious or lost .

So, what does it mean in practical terms? Perhaps it's as simple as standing firm in what you know is right, despite conflicting societal norms, or engaging in acts of kindness inspired by God's love, knowing your labor in the Lord is not in vain (1 Corinthians 15:58). It might mean spending focused time in prayer and scripture, fostering deeper intimacy with God, gaining clarity to discern His voice amidst the noise. This trust assignment is woven intricately into every interaction, every choice, every journey you undertake, and in doing so, you become a living, breathing epistle of God's truth .

Number 3: The Truth Catalyst

This ripple effect of truth can be seen through Jesus' disciples, who, post-resurrection, became fervent messengers of the Gospel. In our present times, you are called to this catalytic role. How, you might ask, can personal revelation become a broader impact? Perhaps it's in your ability to apply these truths to situations around you—be they social justice, personal mentorships, or community development. The skills you've honed, the wisdom you've gained aren't happenstances but tools for divine purposes. Look at how Joseph's truth discerned from dreams set him apart and led to the saving of nations during famine (Genesis 41). Your unique position allows you to address issues in ways no one else can—your voice, uniquely designed for sectors you influence .

This truth-bearing doesn't call for a megaphone but a sincere heart willing to serve as hands and feet of Jesus. Imagine Esther, positioned 'for such a time as this'. She had to recognize truth about her identity and her proximity to power, which was pivotal in her courage to act. Whether it's offering truth-filled counsel, standing up against injustice, or mirroring ethical conduct, each act serves as a flame, spreading and growing until the Father's glory is revealed (Matthew 5:16). Your life becomes a sacred conduit of His truth, birthing reflections of His kingdom on earth as it is in heaven .

Thus, your task isn't limited to understanding truth but invigorated in selfless action. In essence,

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each effort to illuminate God's truth in the earthly realm imprints a piece of eternity onto the world. Through spirit-filled creativity and love, you may inspire individuals, transform situations, and build communities grounded in love, truth, and justice. Through embracing what's revealed to you, you become part of a grand tapestry woven to bridge the earthly with the divine, demonstrating the truth, beauty and simplicity of Christ's love to those yet in search .

Number 4: Navigating the Responsibilities of Truth

Just as God entrusts you with truth, it's crucial to navigate its responsibilities wisely. One might question the weight of it all—such deep revelations and paths illuminated. The Bible clearly states that to whom much is given, much is required (Luke 12:48), and this truth responsibility calls for careful stewardship. Yet, remember Jesus' words in Matthew 5:10-12, where He declares blessings upon those persecuted for righteousness. There's strength in vulnerability, power in persecution when anchored in truth. Truth in love speaks life into others rather than condemnation. It advocates for peace amidst conflict, healing where there is brokenness. Maybe today, living truth in love manifests as offering a listening ear to a friend & a comforting prayer or standing up for a colleague. Likely, it mundanely echoes in voicemails encouraging family or faithfully volunteering, driving community missions that brighten the world's dark corners. Each act done in love plants seeds of God's truth, revealing His heartbeat for humanity .

And what about those whose perspectives clash with your divinely inspired truth? See them as God does, celebrating their inherent worth, urging dialogue over division, love instead of aversion. Jesus calls us to radical love, where even enemies receive kindness (Matthew 5:44), as life lived through this celestial lens stands as a fortress of His peace, love, and truth—shining brightly, magnifying His glory across nations .

Number 6: The Eternal Perspective of Truth

God's choice to reveal truth to you is not just for earthly impact but for eternal preparation. Your grasp of truth extends beyond temporal realities, grounding you in eternal perspectives. As Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 4:18, "So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal" .

This eternal perspective liberates you from the fleeting worries of today, anchoring your soul in divine promises that extend past earthly existence. An eternal viewpoint doesn't ignore temporal needs but paints them with deeper significance. Your

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day-to-day life—work, relationships, hobbies—now becomes infused with greater purpose. Everything, from simple conversations to career decisions, echoes into eternity. It's no longer about striving for transient success but investing in Kingdom values—values grounded in justice, peace, and righteousness aligned with God's vision .

Imagine living in anticipation of eternity, like the heroes of faith in Hebrews 11, who saw the promise from afar and embraced it, influencing generations. It fosters gratitude for the already but not yet reality of God's kingdom, reinforcing that living out God's truth here sets the stage for heavenly realities and consolidates a harmonious, continuous thread from now to forevermore .

Number 7: God's Faithfulness in the Journey of Truth

Finally, the assurance of seeing God's truth comes with the unshakeable promise of His faithfulness. Scriptural narratives are woven with testimonies of His unwavering presence, guiding every truth-seeker through storms, uncertainties, and crossroads. Deuteronomy 31:6 anchors believers in confidence: "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the LORD your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you" .

As you venture into landscapes shaped by God's truths, anticipate challenges; yet amidst these, cling to His faithfulness. He who began a good work in you will perfect it. Isaiah 55:11 reassures that His word will accomplish what He desires, achieving its purpose. Remember Elijah, weary yet met with God's faithful whispers or David, dancing undeterred before the Lord, victorious not by might but by reliance on God's fidelity .

Your experiences along the journey often herald testimonies of God's enduring love. Whether it's new mercies seen at dawn or divine detours that refine, your life bears witness to God's hand at work, reassuring unsure hearts (lamentations in joy, awaiting promises yet to unfold). In challenging moments, in seasons of doubt, proclaim steadfastly like Joshua: "But as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD" (Joshua 24:15).
